Mentorship Program (2021-22)-A

1. General Introduction and Commencement dates of the Schemes for the Sessions

With a view of establishing a healthy communication mechanism among the teachers and students for overall development of the academic environment, the mentorship program of Sikh National College is aimed at personal communication between a teacher and student to solve, guide and address the issues of the students for their overall development apart from classroom teaching with utmost 36 Teacher-mentors teaching in different academic departments of the college. Since then each teacher-mentor is allotted approximately 1-30 mentees for facilitating the students.

Monthly two sessions are conducted by every teacher-mentee with his or her mentees.

In order to execute the mentorship exercise, a teacher is assigned around 30 students for personal interaction with each allotted student. In this way, student can freely discuss, and share his/her query with the teacher in an effective and efficient manner.

3. List of Key Issues Addressed

Detailed discussion is carried out with every student by the teacher, to identify the issues that need to be addressed properly. The students are encouraged to communicate their problems and feeling freely so that appropriate measures can be taken to enhance the overall development of the student. Efforts are made by the mentors to assist the mentees to excel in every field of life to become a responsible citizen. Keeping in mind, the interest and skills of the students, they are encouraged to participate in the cocurricular activities as well. Information regarding government schemes and policies relating to their career development is also provided so that they may get maximum benefits from such schemes. Diverse issues are addressed based upon sharing as well as observance by the mentors so that students may perform well in academic and allied activities. 5. Follow up of Mentor Mentee Reports

Every teacher-mentor prepares a detailed report based upon the interaction with the mentees, which is submitted to the respective head of the department. After that, the heads of the departments submit these reports to Principal, who is the opposite authority for these reports. These reports have been further analysed in collective meeting/s between Principal and the heads of the departments, wherein different aspects and issues are thoroughly discussed. These reports were further utilized for :-

- a) Designing future academic and co-curricular plans for the comprehensive development of the students.
- b) Deciding a particular course of action, if acquired.

6. Decisions taken about the areas of Focus

The whole mentorship program focuses on friendly communication so that each and every aspect of the student may be observed in a fruitful manner. During the discussions, various focus areas are identified that require due attention to attain the objectives of this program. Accordingly, various centers and cells have been established in the college to fulfil the requirements of the students.

I. Career Advancement Cell

To provide the information and guidance, Career Advancement Cell has been guiding and preparing the mentees for appropriate career/s and thus making them job-ready. It includes

Competitive Examination Cell where highly competent, experienced and professionally qualified faculty members train the students for various reputed competitive exams.

II. Communication Skills Programs

To enhance the communication skills, Value Added courses in Spoken English which have been proving relatively effective in bridging the gap between the academic learning and communicative development in the mentees, hailing from rural/semiurban areas. In-campus Coaching Classes for IELTS (International English Language Testing System) for the students aspiring to study abroad are also being imparted.

III. Stress Management

The issue of stress is common among the students. During the interaction, teachermentor conducts counselling sessions to ensure emotional well-being of the students. Motivational lectures, Yoga sessions and personal discussions are carried out to make the students free from stress. As a stress-busting exercise, Department of Music Vocal of our College also offered music sessions to students who were found to be in the nascent stage of stress.

IV. Involvement of Heads of Departments

To develop healthy mentor-mentee interactions, Heads of all Departments of the College have been involved in the mentor-mentee interaction process, hence, it was decided to involve the Heads of departments so that their experience and expertise in their respective fields could be utilized for generating yet more promising and enriching results. All Heads of departments also have already been acting as mentors guiding their distributed lot of mentees.

V. Awareness Regarding COVID Pandemic

As health crisis emerged in the form of Corona Virus, it is the need of the hour to create awareness among the students regarding precautions to be taken to combat the spread of virus. Students have been informed and guided to follow all the guidelines and instructions specifically maintaining social distancing, washing hands regularly, use of face mask etc..

7. Methods adopted to measure outcomes of mentor-mentee schemes for the session

The outcome of the mentor-mentee sessions was assessed by the performance level of the students in different activities including quizzes, group discussions, seminars, stage performances at cultural activities and assignments.
